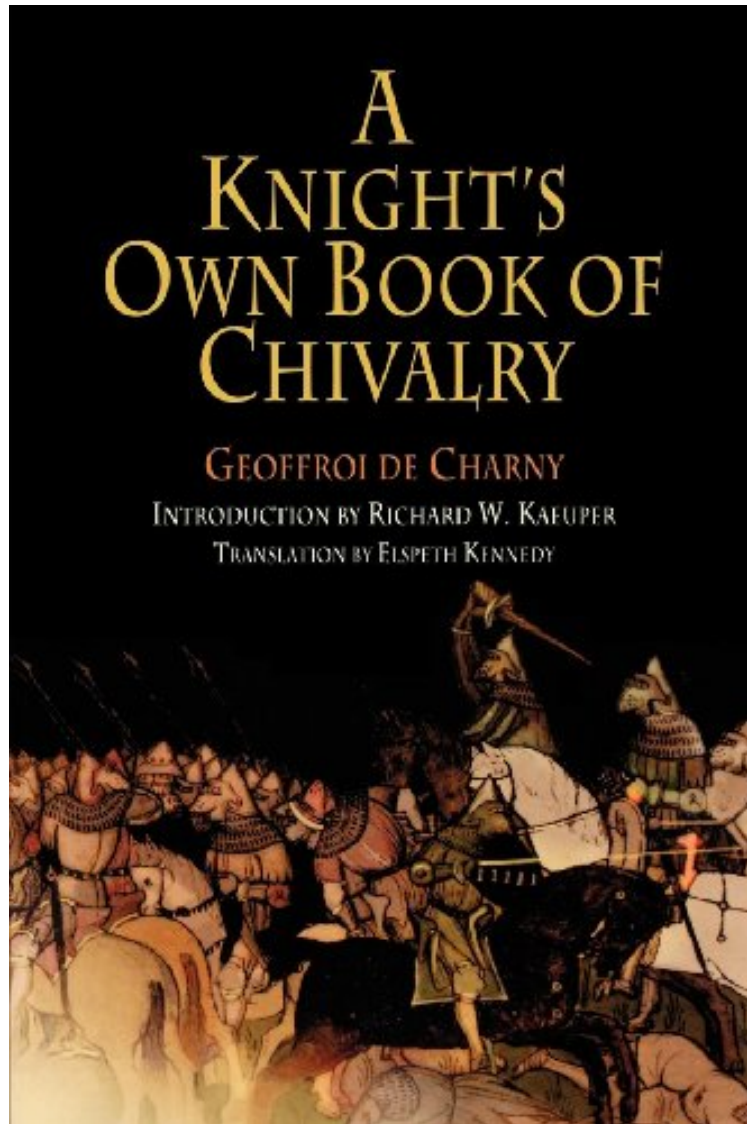

Auch, wenn es keine einheitliche Vorstellung der "chivalric values" gab und dieser "Code of Conduct" je nach Bedarf ausgelegt werden konnte, scheint Charny die beste aller Vorstellungen von Chivalry zusammen gefasst zu haben. Das Buch beginnt mit einer historischen Einleitung, die sowohl das Leben von Geoffroi de Charny (ca. 1306 - 1356) beleuchtet, als auch die gesellschaftlichen Bedingungen, die die Niederschrift dieses Wertesystems erfordert haben können.
